



School Nutrition: Growing Healthy Children

SNA-NC MISSION STATEMENT

School Nutrition — Growing Healthy Children

We know that change in student eating habits takes time. We can't do it alone, but we certainly can make a difference by offering healthy choices for our students. Not only must we offer those healthy choices to our children, but we must be recognized by others as the authority on the nutritional health of our students. As we grow professionally, others will recognize that authority. At our Committee Day event in May, association members came together to identify the strategies needed to help meet the challenge of our identified priority issues. Each committee will work together to achieve their goals. We hope that local chapters will recognize these issues and build programs for professional development. As you achieve your goals locally, make sure you share your accomplishments in the *ARROW*, local newspaper and on your school's Web site.

PRIORITY ISSUES

Membership — Recruit and Increase Membership

Build membership by using the national SNA membership drives to invite new members to join the organization. Make sure every employee in your county knows about your organization and what it has to offer. Share brochures (available from member services committee) and invite new or previously uninterested employees to become involved. Ask, ask, ask. Sometimes we just need to show an interest in another person. Don't take for granted that someone has already asked the "new kid on the block" about becoming involved. Form a membership phone tree. Remind everyone of meeting dates. Make meetings meaningful and enjoyable by planning educational sessions.

Membership — Reactivate and Retain Membership

Have someone at each school be in charge of reminding members when their membership and certification is close to lapsing. There is probably one member at every school who would be willing to be in charge of that job. It's easy to let those dates slip by. Ask that person if they will serve as that school membership committee delegate.

Wellness — Promote State Nutrition Standards and Wellness in Schools

Make sure your school is a Team Nutrition school. That way, you will receive many free materials and activities that you can share with parents and teachers. It's easy to sign up — just check the Web site, www.teamnutrition.usda.gov. What a great way to show others you are the authority. The Web site www. MyPyramid.gov is another great site to gather information. As always, you can check the SNA-NC Web site, www.schoolnutrition-nc.org, for updates in the state nutrition standards.

Professionalism

Start working on encouraging your members to become certified. With opportunities like ServSafe and Serving It Safe and training opportunities for Healthy Edge classes available, it is easier than ever to become certified. We plan to use our state Web site to list training opportunities for members. You will be able to check to see if another county close to you offers training. We will help in making classes available. Don't forget that our district meetings and mid-year chapter leadership offers certification hours.

SNA-NC Executive Board Meeting June 18, 2007 – Greensboro, NC

Palien also reported on the House of Delegate changes for SNA-NC.

Libby Post, treasurer, stated that our assets and liabilities totaled \$552,316.

Cindy Marion, legislative chair, reported that we should contact our senators and encourage them to help us get the money that we need for the 2008 school year. She also recommended that we send two people to lobby school again this year. Moody thanked Marion for all her hard work this year. She also reported that the strategic planning committee met and changed the mission statement and vision statement for the association.

Moody volunteered to serve on the NCASA board that meets in the triangle area so that Palien would not have to drive from Asheville for the meetings.

Kathy Buelin, president-elect, went over her plan of work for 2007 to 2008. The main focus is on membership, especially recruitment and retention. It was also voted that we send the industry chair to the SNA Industry Conference in the off years of the SNA-NC Industry Seminar. Buelin also gave her budget report for 2007 to 2008.

Palien read the House of Delegates changes for SNA for ANC in Chicago. Staff contracts were voted on and approved by the executive board. It was also voted that SNA-NC send a representative to the AG First Forum. The meeting adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

Daughn Baker, industry chair, gave an update from the trade show. The golf tournament made \$2,440 from the sale of mulligans, red tees and raffle tickets.

The executive board member list and the 2007 to 2008 calendar was reviewed by the board. With no other business or announcements, the meeting adjourned at 12:31 p.m.

The last major goal was to increase opportunities to encourage

health and wellness. Implementing wellness policies at the local level, using HACCP controls and monitoring SMI standards were ways we accomplished this goal. This year's theme, "Building Student Achievement through Good Nutrition," kept us focused on this goal. When students are well fed, they are at their optimum for learning.

We are anticipating state reimbursement for the first time in our history. At this moment, CNS funds are identified in both the house and the senate budgets, but we are waiting for the conferees to determine the final dollar amount that will be passed in the 2007 to 2008 state budget. To have new funding for any educational initiative in the budget is a major accomplishment, but to see the final result will be a dream-cometrue for CNS programs in North Carolina and for the students we serve. The additional funding will be used to increase the fruits and vegetables we offer as well as the whole grain products we are adding to our menus. Your E-mails, calls and visits with your local represen-

tatives have helped us accomplish this goal. Thanks to each of you!

I hope you were able to attend the conference in Greensboro. Beth Palien and the Steering Committee did a fantastic job bringing renowned speakers and mini-session leaders to keep us informed.

The culinary and creative



arts entries inspired us to be the best we can be. The trade show was packed with vendors and members sharing and discussing the latest and best foods, equipment and services available. It was a week packed with many opportunities to learn and to network with old and new friends.

I challenge each of you to make the most of this new year. Set goals that will benefit the members in your chapter and the students they serve. 

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This legislative session has been a roller coaster ride. I am so proud of the work our association has done. We were included in both the house and senate budget for the first time ever, and we have gotten a tremendous amount of press coverage. We collected more than 3,000 resolutions of support! One thing

"We started this campaign to get funding for the nutrition standards, and we will not give up until we have the money." is for sure: this has been one of the hottest topics during this legislative session.

Our state LAC was a great success! We had 165 members attend, which was our largest group ever. We conducted our first press conference during the

LAC, which brought us state and national coverage. Our quest for funding is one that may take time and effort as we continue to educate our legislators and the public on our needs. Rep. Doug Yongue and Rep.Verla Insko have been great champions for our program and have fought to keep it in the budget.

We have some legislators that still do not understand the program or its needs. Three legislators feel that a per-plate distribution of funding wasn't equable. It has been proposed that the implementation of the standards be delayed a year and a study be conducted to look at the distribution of the fund. The association feels that the per-plate distribution of funds is fair, and we want the standards to be funded this session, but we understand patience is necessary to gain the results we desire. If this provision is approved, a decision on funding would be

delayed till next spring. Local districts would be encouraged to implement the standards within their existing funds by the end of 2008 but not mandated.

Our lobbyists and our members have spent a great deal of time educating the appropriations committee. They have all of the

facts to make an informed decision on this issue.


We are delighted by the expansion of the Kindergarten Breakfast Program. We've waited a long time for this milestone! This is not a journey that will come easy nor is it for those who are not tenacious. We started this campaign to get funding for the nutrition standards, and we will not give up until we have the money. If it happens in this session, great! If we have to come

back in the short session, then so be it. Remember that you are a voter, and you have the power.

When this session is over, we will be following up with the folks who helped us and the folks who did not. I will post a follow-up article on the Web site in regards to the final decision of the general assembly. It takes a grassroots effort to get things done! Ask your legislator if they supported the standards. Many of the folks are up for reelection. Let them know that you expect them to represent you in Raleigh and that you do follow their actions.

Remember the words of Margaret Mead, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."





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Growing Healthy Children Through Professional Development By Lorie Reece, Education/Certification Chair

The Certification Program offered through the School Nutrition Association and SNA-NC serves to ensure the professional development of its members. To help our children grow healthy, we must continually seek education opportunities to grow professionally. Individuals seeking certification must meet specific level requirements for experience, academic education, formal training and job performance as listed on the National Certification Application. These recommended requirements establish a common foundation of knowledge and skills for each level.

The purposes of the certification program are to:

- Give recognition for having achieved a specific level of professional development.
- Provide a pathway for further advancement in the profession.
- Establish credentials essential for job performance.

When the requirements are verified through the necessary documentation, certification will be granted for a threeyear period. Once certified, individuals must earn approved continuing education units in education activities and programs to renew certification.

Requirements for certification include:

- One year of school food service experience (during which you can complete the 30 hours of specialized training requirements for level 1).
- Complete the SNA certification application and include the certification fee.
- Have the child nutrition director or supervisor sign the application. Include documentation of education requirements, such as diploma, certificate or college transcript.

Credentialing is another program sponsored by SNA. It was created to enhance the professional image of school food service and nutrition professionals who have reached a higher education level. A key purpose of SNA is to develop and encourage the highest standards and provide education programs for professional development of school food and nutrition personnel. The credentialing program includes standards for academic and specialized training, knowledge and skills.

Thank you for sending your prior approval requests to me in a timely manner. Please send requests at least six weeks in advance and send them to the address listed below. Also, make sure you are sending all the necessary items for me to make the approval. Complete the SNA-NC approval form for CEUs found in the 2007 Chapter Leadership Manual and on the SNA-NC Web site. The number of CEUs requested cannot include registration time, breaks, meals, entertainment or business meetings. Along with the completed form, you must include a printed agenda or outline with opening and closing times, speaker or presenter's qualifications or current position, and the program evaluation form if that is the evaluation method used. This will help make sure your attendance roster is sent to you as quickly as possible. Please make a copy of the roster for your records and send the original printed roster to National SNA within five days after your event.
